Kitsap Audubon Society, in partnership with the United States Coast Guard, sponsors and supports the Motus Wildlife Tracking Station at this location.

Point No Point County Park is an internationally designated Important Bird Area (IBA). Its favorable habitat, location and shape serve as a converging pathway for the migratory movement of such research targeted species as Northern Saw-whet Owl, Dunlin, Swainson's Thrush, and Little Brown Bat.

The Motus Wildlife Tracking System is an international collaborative research network that uses cooperative automated radio telemetry to track small flying organisms (birds, bats, and insects). This system facilitates research and education on the ecology and conservation of migratory animals. "Motus," Latin for movement, is a program of Birds Canada in partnership with collaborating researchers and organizations. The yellow dots on this map show the locations of Motus stations in the Washington region.
